

Campsite Handbook 2017

Fire Assessment, Arrangements and General Risk Assessments

Introduction

The aim of this Handbook is to provide all Youth Leaders with suggestions to:

- · Help raise awareness to risk;
- To suggest control measures to help mitigate the risk; and
- To manage risk pro-actively.

This handbook takes many of the component parts of staying on a campsite, identifies potential risks and suggests control measures to manage them. The handbook is effectively a lot of "handy hints".

Youth leaders should read and absorb the contents of this Handbook. The suggestions made in this handbook are intended to be helpful, realistic and practical.

All these aspects of risk are the responsibility of everyone. Being alert to risk and thinking and looking ahead are crucial for all young people within your group.

Campsite Fire Assessment

Identified Hazard	Risk	Control Measures
Electric hook ups	Electrocution Electric shock Fire Risk of serious injury	 Electrical hook ups supplied by Three Counties conform to safety regulations and have been maintained regularly Pitch supply points within suitable distance of each pitch requiring supply
Camp cooking and open fires	Burns Fire	 Note: Campfires and open fires are not allowed on site Respect the distances required between tents (6m between groups, 3m between tents within one group) Use camp stoves and BBQ's with care, ensuring they are steady and do not get close to inflammable material and are not too large Adults are responsible for cooking or are properly supervising if young people are assisting Ensure cooker fuel is safely stored and turned off after use Never cook inside a small tent (safe cooking distance is 3m from tent) Never cook near long grass, it can set alight easily Remove any litter and rubbish to reduce risk of fire spreading Don't leave pans unattended Turn off all appliances before you go out or to bed Ensure adequate ventilation Ensure Campsite's fire safety arrangements have been communicated. Please refer to Fire Arrangements section There are two fire stations. At the station is an emergency alarm, a water extinguisher and a sand fire bucket

Identified Hazard	Risk	Control Measures
Smoking	Fire	 Smoking is only allowed in designated areas Smoking is not allowed in Venues or Campsite
Candles	Burns Fire	Campers advised never to use lighted candles in or near a tent and to keep a torch handy in case of emergencies

Campsite Fire Arrangements

Fire Stations


- There are two fire stations situated in the camping field. Each fire station is signposted.
- At each station is an emergency alarm, a water extinguisher and a sand fire bucket.

What to do if there is a fire (no matter how small)

- Keep calm and get everyone out as quickly as possible
- Raise alarm at station
- Contact Limitless Festival Team who will Dial 999 and give details of fire or if you are unable to contact them then;
- Dial 999 and give details of fire
- Proceed to the fire evacuation/assembly point is the Main Show Ring behind Severn Hall

Note(s):

- It is the Youth Leader's responsibility to evacuate their pitch.
- It is the Youth Leader's responsibility to inform their group of the route to the assembly point.
- For any misuse of the fire equipment Infuse reserves the right to remove any person from the event.

Campsite General Risk Assessments		
Those at risk All those staying on campsite		

Identified Hazard	Risk	Control Measures
Tents Guy lines	Slips and trips Injury: sprains, cuts,	 Youth group leaders to identify specifics Keep guy lines short and away from access
Tent pegs	bruises, potential broken limbs	routes Tent pegs should be driven right into the ground Supervise the use of mallets
Inadequate lighting	Slips and trips Injury	 There is minimal lighting on the campsite, and only near the toilet blocks. Uneven ground is therefore a hazard at night Ensure all campers have torches for use at night Have spare batteries
Hygiene Cooking Washing WC/Shower facilities	Illness – sickness, upset stomach	 Take care to be clean and hygienic Select non-perishable foods which will not go bad quickly Check water sources are fresh and clean Cook food thoroughly Always wash hands after using the toilet and before handling food
Hot/Sunny Weather Conditions	Sun burn/sun stroke/heat exhaustion	 Keep young people hydrated; ensure they drink lots of fluid Ensure group use sun protection SPF 15 (minimum recommended) Stay in the shade where possible, wear a hat and loose fitting clothes Where possible plan activities outside of the hottest time of the day (11.00am – 3.00pm)
Cold/Wet Weather Conditions	Hypothermia	 Youth Leaders to ensure appropriate clothing Waterproof clothes Ensure adequate change of clothes in the event those they are wearing are wet Ensure tents have ground insulation Sleeping bags & tents are in good condition

Removal of waste material and rubbish	Illness and infestation	 Youth Leaders to ensure rubbish is bagged and taken to skip provided by Severn Hall
